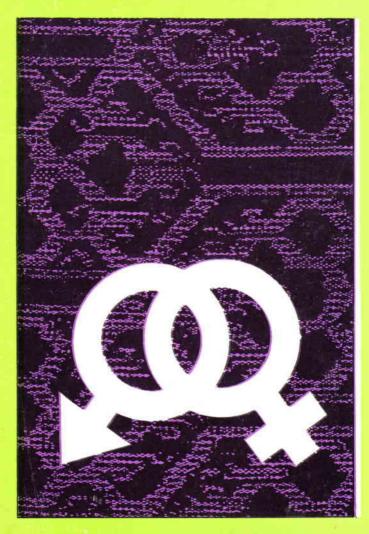

#### What is a GAD Focal Point?

A GAD Focal Point is a mechanism tasked to catalyze, coordinate, provide direction to, and serve as technical adviser on women/gender and development efforts within an agency, a sector or a locality.

#### Where may a GAD Focal Point be set up?

A GAD Focal Point may be set up

- in any government agency departments, bureaus, government-owned or controlled corporations, state colleges and universities, attached agencies, LGUs, etc.
- within inter-agency or local councils, such as development or coordinating councils in the regional, provincial, city, municipal or barangay level.

## What is the legal basis for establishing a GAD Focal Point?

Executive Order 348, which approves and adopts the Philippine Development Plan for Women (PDPW), and the Implementing Rules and Regulations of RA 7192 (Women in Development and Nation-Building Act) explicitly direct all government agencies to set up GAD Focal Point.

#### Why a GAD Focal Point?

The establishment of the GAD Focal Point is one of the strategies adopted to facilitate and sustain the implementation of the PDPW. The Focal Point, then, serves as one of the mechanisms through which the government hopes to realize its commitment to the promotion of women's well-being and their effective participation in all aspects of national life.

#### Who compose a GAD Focal Point?

The membership/composition of the Focal Point may vary depending on the needs of the agency or the locality it serves. Often, however, it is headed by someone who has enough clout in the agency (e.g., an Undersecretary or Assistant Regional Director) and has a strong influence on agency planning and operations. The members are also relatively influential personnel (e.g., bureau directors or service chiefs) of the planning, training, data management, personnel, regional operations, legislative liaising and/or research units of an agency.

In the case of the region, members of the Inter-agency Regional Focal Point may come from the Regional Development Council. Such model may also be considered for LGU focal points.

## What are the functions of the GAD Focal Point?

The bulk of the Focal Point's work involves direction setting, advocacy, monitoring, coordination and technical advisory on gender and development concerns. The Focal Point is not the workhorse of the agency. Promotion of gender and development concerns is the responsibility of the entire agency, not the Focal Point alone.

In terms of specific tasks, the Focal Point is expected to:

- conduct a regular review of the agency's mandate, objectives, key result areas, budget, policies, programs and projects to ensure that they are genderresponsive;
- develop a capability-building program for agency personnel tasked with the implementation of gender and development efforts;
- facilitate the conduct of gender-sensitivity training for top officials of the agency;
- hold regular reporting meetings/dialogues on GAD concerns with the agency head;
- develop a monitoring scheme to keep track of developments on GAD within the agency; and
- adopt a capability building program of its own as Focal Point and internal GAD catalyst.
